their pre-school and early elementary school years. The research proposed here is concerned with the experiences and status of Head Start graduates and their families as they progress through school.

The study will build on the successful recruitment and maintenance of a sample of 120 Head start children and families from Rhode Island now in the 4th and 5th grades and will include a non-Head Start sample.

The study will assess children's academic achievement, socialemotional and behavioral adjustment, family support, and family involvement in learning from the fall of 1997 through the spring of 2000. It will also investigate the kinds of family support services needed and received by families, and the impact of those services on family members and children.

The researchers are primarily concerned with the impact of family support services and family involvement in children's learning in so far as it influences child outcomes. They propose to examine closely what types and what intensity of family support services work best with which types of families under which circumstances. They anticipate that the results of this research will define new ways to assess families and plan family services. These more appropriate family interventions will help strengthen family self-sufficiency, involvement, and support for children's learning and school adjustment. The total federal request is for \$147,000 each year for three years.
