Active Head for 20 Years of Women's E. and I. Union

## Prominent Club Woman Took Deep Interest in Social Work

Mrs Mary Morton Kehew, wife of William B. Kehew, perhaps best known as the active head of the Women's Educational and Industrial Union for more than 20 years, died at her home, 29A Chestnut st, yesterday,

Although her service as president of that institution terminated in 1913, it has been noted that as a mark of honor no one has since that time been ap-

pointed to the office.

She was born in Boston on Sept 9, 1859, and was before her marriage Miss Mary Morton Kimball, daughter of the late M. Day Kimball and Susan T. Kimlate M. May Kilindal and Susail T. Alimball. Previous to her accepting the office of president of the union she was corresponding secretary for jesveral years. Even since her resignation as president she has served as chairman of the board of government. She had been active in suffrage affairs

sne had been active in samage analytic promotion of the interests of the blind. She was a trustee of Simmons College and a member of the executive committee of the Massachusetts. Child Labor Commission. Among the other associations with which she was other associations with which she was connected are: The Women's Trade Union League, the Women's Auxiliary of the Massachusetts Civil Service Reform Association, the School Voters' League, the College Settlement Asso-ciation, the Tyler-st Nursery and many others.

She was a member of the Mayflower Club, the Twentieth Century Club, the Women's City Club and the Eusiness Women's Club. She is survived by her husband, two sisters, Mrs Robert Far-Women's Ciuo. Sae is survived by hes-husband, two sisters, Mrs Robert Far-ley Clerk and Miss Hannah Parker Kimball, and a brother, Marcus Mortou Kimball, all of Boston. Funeral services will be held at Mt

Auburn Chapel tomorrow noon.
